10p Mile Fund Raiser

When the decision to convert St Aidan's Church to a Community hall was made one of the more unusual fund raising suggestions put forward was the 10p Mile.

The idea was to create a line of 10p coins edge-to-edge that would stretch between the front door of Broughty Ferry New Kirk to the front door of St Aidan's. The two buildings are only a few hundred yards apart, but a mile long route was laid out via Gray Street, Brook Street, Lawrence Street, King Street, Beach Crescent and St Vincent Street.

A 10p coin measures a little bit short of an inch. Rounding up there are 39 coins in a yard; if you prefer metres the total is 42 coins. On that basis the total number of 10p coins works out at 67,340. That amounts to £6,734, a tidy sum to add to all the other fund raising efforts.

The official start of the 10p Mile began on Sunday, September 25, 2011, when members of the Youth Organisations laid down the first 10p coins at the front door of Broughty Ferry New Kirk after the morning service. It took a £100 worth of 10ps to reach the main gate at St Vincent Street/Queen Street.

As the number of 10ps donated increased, the congregation was able to "follow the money" as progress was plotted on a map of the route. The first £1000 (divided by 39) gave a total of 256 yards, which was the middle of the level crossing in Gray Street. Moving on before a train arrived the line of 10ps snaked along Brook Street, and down Lawrence Street.

Donations came in many different currencies. Apart from bags of coins from 1p to £1, there were pre-decimal coins, equally valuable because banks still take old money provided each denomination is made up to the value of £1. Eight half crowns (2/6, 12.5p) to £1; ten florins (2/-) to £1. There were also Euros and foreign coins handed in. The Euros were counted, bagged and sold to holiday makers going to the Continent, and one person who travelled regularly to America was happy to buy all the dimes, nickles, dollars and half dollars donated. One unusual find was a 10 cent coin commemorating the surrender of the British Army at the Battle of Saratoga. The coin was bought by a keen numismatist.

When Covid restrictions closed all the churches donations stopped, but resumed as restrictions were lifted and members began to return to New Kirk. Since Rev Catherine Collins retired and New Kirk, St James, and St Luke's and Queen Street began moving to a Union, bags of coins have continued to be handed in.

The St Aidan's Project is complete and the building is in daily use by many church as well as outside organisations. But the 10p Mile has continued slowly but steadily and at the last check the total raised so far is over £2800, around 700 yards. The original reason for the fund raiser is long gone; but we're almost half way there, and it would be a shame if we did not finish what we started. **Archie Darroch**

Finding a Broughty Ferry branch on my family tree

When I was a mere twig on the family tree, my father, Ronald Francis Dick, wove tales of Scottish heather-covered heath and windswept shores, a land of kilted pipers and clever lasses who baked the best scones in the kingdom. He would pat the stoneware crock of marmalade and say, "Your Great-Grandpa James set sail to seek his fortune in America, leaving behind mother, brother and sweetheart. He became a master builder in New York City and sent for Grandma Jane. They married the day she landed in 1880."

In 1967, when I was ten, Dad whisked my mother and me to Scotland. We explored Lowlands and Highlands, but outside Perth, car trouble spoiled the tour and we missed Dundee. Years later, Dad would shake his head wistfully and talk about returning someday to find Grandpa James's own ancestors, about whom he knew very little. Although Dad did return to Dundee before his death in 2015, he never got to Broughty Ferry nor extend his reach past 1880.

My mother's passing brought their travel journals to me. Reading about that journey again, I was determined to find what had eluded him.

On June 20th, this year a day of showery sunshine, I found myself approaching St Aidan's Kirk, knowing only that somewhere in its churchyard was a stone recording two of my Dad's namesakes: Francis (1822-1859), father of great-grandpa James, and Francis senior (1793-1864).

An unfamiliar churchyard can be a bit overwhelming when you're seeking just one gravestone. Thank my lucky stars, St Aidan's New Kirk volunteers Linda Crighton and Sheila Duncan were tending graves in the forecourt, and gave me clues where to search. To my astonishment, amid the grasses of no-mow-May, we found the very stone I was seeking! To view the stone listing my great- and great-great grandparents touched my heart.

The genealogist sent me one last follow-up that very evening, pointing me to tiny Murroes churchyard. There, again by astounding luck, I found the grave marker of Francis senior's father, Gilbert, and grandfather David. The line of master builders that continued to my Dad's electrician father began there: Gilbert, a weaver, was also a carpenter. My Dad broke the mould: he was a history teacher, building up young minds instead of sturdy buildings. I believe he'd be delighted that I followed the family tree, root and branch, so far back. Thanks to St. Aidan's, I could complete the task Dad set himself more than 50 years ago.

With Refugees Broughty Ferry (WRBF)

WRBF is a group of people based in Broughty Ferry who help refugees here in Dundee and overseas. We are affiliated to the Broughty Ferry Churches Group. Our approach is based on volunteering. We act as a conduit between people who are interested in providing some time and energy to working with refugees, and opportunities for volunteering. In this we work with a number of local groups and bodies who provide services to refugees, such as the Baptist Church at Panmurefield.

Typically volunteers can become mentors of individual refugees or simply offer friendship. There are opportunities also for group activities involving play, music and arts, while we can direct people to help in the work of sourcing, packing and transporting clothing and other items to refugees in Europe, particularly those affected by the war in Ukraine.

CHRISTIAN AID MAY

We knitted, ate cake, socialised, crafted, were challenged, danced, walked and generally had fun for Christian Aid in May.

SOCIALISE – Broughty Ferry Churches Group organised the Christian Aid coffee morning on 13th May in the New Kirk Halls. We had a very successful morning, filling the tables in the hall while also selling cakes & candy, crafts, books and jigsaws and also having a raffle a hamper and guessing how many beans were in a jar.

DANCE – In Christian Aid week we joined other churches in the Invercarse for a Ceilidh organised by Rev Caroline Taylor. She invited the churches she was involved in with a wish to see us dancing instead of sitting in the pews and she achieved her aim. About 100 people of all ages danced to live music and had fun.

WALK – Later in the month a group of 10 of us walked the 8 miles of the boundaries of the three parishes. This is the third year we have done this – reviving the ancient tradition of beating the bounds. The custom of beating the bounds goes back to the Anglo Saxon period at least. In the days before maps and written title deeds a knowledge of the physical boundaries of property was very important. So the custom grew up of walking the boundaries, stopping at intervals to strike boundary stones to 'mark' the bounds. Villagers, with the rector and other local dignitaries, would walk the parish bounds during Rogationtide—the fifth week after Easter— which generally falls in May and therefore it feels right to Beat the Bounds for Christian Aid.

In total we were involved in raising around £2450 for Christian Aid. WELL DONE everyone!
